2009 ISHS Presidential and Board Elections

In Fall 2009, the Society held its biennial Board elections. With 109 returned ballots, Elliott Oring (California State University, Los Angeles) received the majority of the votes cast for ISHS President. He will serve as ISHS President through December 31, 2011. Laura Chao-Chih Liao (National Chiayi University, Taiwan) and Andrea Samson Stanford University, USA) were elected as ISHS Board Members-at-large and will serve through December 2013. We thank Christie Davies (University or Reading, United Kingdom) for his service as ISHS President for 2008 and 2009 and Lorene Birden (University of Dijon, France) and Wladislaw Chlopiki for their roles as ISHS Board Members from January 2006 through 2009. Our best wishes to the new ISHS President and Board members.

Message from the New President

From Elliott Oring, California State University Los Angeles



I am honored to have been elected as the new president of ISHS. I would like to thank the past-president Christie Davies for his stewardship of the Society over the past two years and for his support during my term of office. The most important officer in the Society is not president, however, but executive secretary. The executive secretary not only directs the operations of the organization on a day-to-day basis, but provides the continuity essential to its functioning. It is the executive secretary that keeps the president and other members of the board on task, alert to goals previously set, and continuing efforts previously initiated. It is fortunate for the ISHS that Martin Lampert holds this critical administrative position.

My goal as president, as of previous presidents, is to help shape policy that will support the excellence of ISHS publications and conferences and maintain the good reputation of humor studies in general. However, the landscape of the academy and of scholarship in which the ISHS must operate is changing. Support for the administration of scholarly organizations and their journals is not what it once was. Universities only support journal editorships reluctantly, if they support them at all. Organizational work on behalf of scholarly societies is rarely viewed by university committees as fulfilling the service requirements requisite for tenure, promotion, and merit awards. Libraries no longer routinely purchase hard copies of scholarly journals. More and more, the dissemination of scholarly research is moving to online, open source publication and listserv exchange. The ISHS board and the membership need to be alert to, and even anticipate, changes in the research, publishing, and academic environment. It is the job of the ISHS board to ensure that contributions to humor research come from scholars in a wide range of disciplines, that these scholars are able to exchange information and ideas easily, that enthusiasm and debate continue to be generated, and that humor research is respected by academic institutions and granting agencies everywhere. To accomplish this task, the ISHS will have to strengthen itself structurally, financially, and politically to meet the challenges of the future.

Social Networks in Humor Research – Boon or Bane?

Have you recently been invited to join a social forum such as *facebook*, *LinkedIn* or any other substitute for direct social contact? Do you regularly count your "followers" on *academia.edu* or your "friends" on *facebook*? Then you may belong to a community of researchers who try to use social networks for their research contacts. The question remains whether social networks provide enough professional benefit in comparison to the time you may spend in the Internet.

I have been a satisfied member of *facebook and academia* for several months, but when a fried asked me about the professional benefit, there was very little I could remember: On the one hand, through *facebook* I get to know what my friends in humor research do besides doing serious research. I think this is very interesting, but not exactly a professional benefit. On the other hand, the academic social network *academia.edu* is much more centered on professional contacts, and it has recently added a general humor research category (http://lists.academia.edu/Seemembers-of-Humour-Research), but it is at the same time a rather dull place to spend one's time.

Are social networks useful for humor research? It seems that establishing contacts via social networks has a growing importance—also in our professional lives. However, there are also more traditional ways of distributing knowledge and establishing contacts (home pages, email etc.). Moreover there is also the possibility of managed websites such as *Who is Who of Humor Research* by Igor Krichtafovitch which includes many members of the ISHS.

In the next issue of the *Humorous Times* we want to publish a list of digital services that may be used to establish professional contacts in humor research. As it is difficult to keep track of all developments in the Internet we would like to ask our readers to inform us about mailing-lists and social networks. Comic Relief: A Comprehensive Philosophy of Humor by John Morreall. Chichester, United Kingdom, 2009, US\$ 41.95. ISBN: 978-1-4051-9612-3

From the publisher: Comic Relief develops an inclusive theory that integrates psychological, aesthetic, and ethical issues relating to humor. It offers an enlightening and accessible foray into the serious business of humor and reveals how standard theories of humor fail to explain its true nature and actually support traditional prejudices against humor as being antisocial, irrational, and foolish. A foreword is provided by Robert Mankoff, Cartoon Editor of *The New Yorker*.

Recent Humor Research Books (continued)

Humor in Interaction. Edited by Neal R. Norrick and Delia Chiaro. Amsterdam: John Benjamins, 2009; € 90.00, US\$ 135.00. ISBN: 978-90-272-5427-6.

This volume provides a rich collection of essays by an international array of scholars representing various theoretical perspectives, but all concerned with interactional aspects of humor. All the articles draw on empirical material from different countries and cultures, comprising conversations among friends and family, talk in workplace situations, humor in educational settings, and experimental approaches to humor in interaction.

Humour in Language Education: Transcription, Categorisation and Analysis by Carmen Popescu. Saarbrücken: VDM Verlag Dr. Müller, 2009; US\$ 112.00. ISBN: 978-3-639-17902-6.

This book looks at the role of humor in language education, focusing principally on the examination of humorous interaction, and draws on the traditions of classroom discourse analysis, conversation analysis and micro-ethnography. Foreign language classroom-specific humor is described, a form of humor characteristic of foreign language classrooms, which facilitates learning by transmitting knowledge in the form of humorous talk around a text. The conclusions should be especially useful to textbook writers, teachers and teacher educators who may be interested in using humor in their language classes.

The Primer of Humor Research (Paperback Edition). Edited by Victor Raskin. Berlin: Mouton de Gruyter, 2009. (Humor Research [HR] 8); € 32.95 / USS 46.00. ISBN 978-3-11-018685-7.

The book is intended to provide a definitive view of the field of humor research for both beginning and established scholars in a variety of fields who are developing an interest in humor and need to familiarize themselves with the available body of knowledge. Each chapter of the book is devoted to an important aspect of humor research or to a disciplinary approach to the field, and each is written by the leading expert or emerging scholar in that area.
