2011 Conference Awards and Scholarships

In 2006, the ISHS Executive Board established Scholarly Contribution and Graduate Student Awards (GSA) to acknowledge individuals presenting notable humor research at ISHS Conferences. These awards include **stipends to cover Conference fees**, and up to four awards may be given annually, depending on available funding. Scholarly Contribution Awards (SCA) are intended to honor individuals who have made outstanding contributions to humor research through high quality publications, conference presentations, and other scholarly activities. SCA recipients present their research in a Conference plenary session. Any ISHS member may submit SCA nominations to the ISHS Awards Committee.

All ISHS graduate student members, planning to attend the 2011 ISHS Conference in Boston, are eligible to apply for a GSA. As part of their conference application, interested students must submit (1) a letter of intent to compete for a GSA, (2) a description of their research program within humor studies, (3) a presentation proposal, and (4) all required registration materials and fees. GSA recipients present their work at a special session of the annual conference and receive (1)

a certificate of achievement, (2) a stipend to reimburse their Conference registration fees, and (3) waived fees to selected ISHS-endorsed seminars and workshops.

Thirty Five Years of Humor Conferences

The history of scholarly international humor conferences dates back to a conference held in Cardiff 35 years ago. In this issue, Don Nilsen, ISHS historian, provides a short history of ISHS.

A Short History of the International Society for Humor Studies

Between 1976 and 1985 there were international humor conferences in Cardiff, Wales (1976, Antony Chapman and Hugh Foot), Los Angeles, California (1979, Harvey Mindess and Joy Turek), Washington, DC (1982, Rufus Browning, Larry Mintz, and Herb Cummings) Tel Aviv, Israel (1984, Avner Ziv), and Cork, Ireland (1985, Desmond McHale).

In 1980, Alleen and Don Nilsen invited Art Buchwald to visit the ASU campus and talk with some ASU professors about starting a humor organization. What resulted from that conference was a three-state conference under the title "Western Humor and Irony Membership," because it was developed "on a WHIM." In 1982 this organization went international, and changed its name to "World Humor and Irony Membership." Under the WHIM rubric we hosted six conferences at Arizona State University, and a year after each conference we published our proceedings under the title of WHIMSY: "World Humor and Irony Membership Serial Yearbook." Because each paper at the conference was condensed from ten pages to less than two pages, we called them "concretes" rather than "abstracts" of the presentations. In 1988, Victor Raskin took the conference to Purdue University; in 1989 Margaret Baker and Jesse Crisler hosted the conference at BYU-Hawaii. It was at BYU-Hawaii that some conference attendees complained that they had trouble getting their universities to pay for them to attend conferences about WHIMSY, so the name became the more serious International Society for Humor Studies (ISHS). From 1990 to 1993 ISHS held conferences in Sheffield England (1990, Mark Glazer), Saint Catharines, Canada (1991, Anne-Marie Guilmette), in Paris, France (1992, Judith Stora-Sandor and Nelly Feuerhahn), in Luxembourg (1993, Larry Sherman).

Since half of our membership were US citizens, and the other half were not, and since most of our conference proposals were coming from foreign countries, it was soon decided that we should alternate the conference sites so that on even numbered years our conferences would be in the US and on odd numbered years our conferences would not be in the US, or vise versa. So 1994 in Ithaca, New York (Mary Ann Rishel) was followed by 1995 in Birmingham England (George Paton); and 1996 in Sydney Australia (Jessica Milner Davis and John McCallum) was followed by 1997 in Edmond, Oklahoma (Amy Carroll); and 1998 in Bergen, Norway (Sven Svebak) was followed by 1999 in Oakland, California (Martin Lampert); and 2000 in Osaka, Japan (Hiroshi Inoue and Goh Abe) was followed by 2001 in College Park, Maryland (Larry Mintz); and 2002 in Forlí, Italy (Delio Chiaro) was followed by 2003 in Chicago, Illinois (Judith Kaplan-Weinger and Richard Hallett); and 2004 in Dijon, France (Lorene Birden) was followed by Youngstown, Ohio (Salvatore Attardo); and 2006 in Copenhagen, Denmark (Martin Fuhr) was followed by 2007 in Newport, Rhode Island (Margaret Mathias); and 2008 in Alcala de Henares, Spain (Juan Garcia Cerrada, Carmen Valero-Garces and Begona Carbelo Baquero) was followed by 2009 in Long Beach, California (Amy Bippus); and 2010 in Hong Kong (Xiaodong Yue) will be followed by 2011 in Boston, Massachusetts (Patrice Oppliger); and 2012 in Krakow Poland (Wladyslaw Chlopicki) will be followed by 2013 somewhere in the United States.

In 1988 Victor Raskin published the first issue of *HUMOR: International Journal of Humor Research*, and this is now the premier journal in the field of humor studies, with Salvatore Attardo functioning as the Editor-in-Chief, Victor Raskin functioning as the Editor-at-Large, Giselinde Kuipers as the Associate Editor, Amy Bippus, Jessica Milner Davis and Giovannantonio Forabosco functioning as Book Review Editors, and Martin Lampert functioning as the Executive Secretary of ISHS. In the meantime, the WHIMSY concretes have become the more traditional conference abstracts, and as Kurt Vonnegut would say, "so it goes...."
