Association News

Fall 2006 Ballot Results

The ISHS membership voted by mail in Fall 2006 on five amendments to the ISHS Constitution. These amendments included:

- (1) The Creation of an Associate Membership Status
- (2) Appointment Procedures for ISHS Newsletter Editors
- (3) The Creation of the Board Position of Historian
- (4) Articulated Procedures for Filling Board Vacancies
- (5) Articulated Procedures for Balloting

The ISHS Executive Secretary sent out ballots in mid-November and voting officially closed on December 31, 2007. The ISHS Constitution requires that two-thirds of the members voting on an amendment must approve that amendment for it to take effect. Of the 67 members who voted, 97% approved the Creation of an Associate Member Status, the Newsletter Editor Appointment Procedures, and the ISHS Historian Position. All voting members (100%) approved the Procedures for Filling Board Vacancies and for Balloting. The ISHS Constitution was revised in January 2007 to reflect these approved amendments.

Nineteenth International Society for Humor Studies Conference

Salve Regina University, Newport, Rhode Island, June 28 to July 1, 2007

Salve Regina University in Newport, Rhode Island (USA) is delighted to host the 19th annual conference of the International Society for Humor Studies. The campus is located in the heart of Newport within walking distance of world class beaches, the famed Cliff Walk, and Newport harbor. The conference will host four days of plenary lectures, paper sessions, and workshops on humor studies, and special events will include an opening night wine and cheese reception, an improvisation contest, and a Conference banquet.

Call for Papers: For the 2007 ISHS Conference, scholars, professionals, and students are invited to submit 250 word proposals for papers, posters, colloquia, and workshops, and other forms of presentation related to humor research. **The deadline for submissions is April 1, 2007.** An ISHS Program Committee will evaluate all entries and will provide notification of acceptance by April 15, 2007.

All proposals should include:

- a copy of a completed registration form;
- the title and the type of the presentation (paper, poster, colloquium, or workshop);
- for individual papers, two copies of a 250 word (or less) abstract;
- for colloquia, an overview along with the presenters' names and copies of their abstracts;
- any technical or special equipment needs, and
- a statement indicating interest to chair a session.

Colloquia and workshops should be designed for 90 minute sessions with up to four presenters; individual papers should be planned for 20 to 25 minute presentations.

Interdisciplinary Workshop on "The Phonetics of Laughter"

Conference Reports

Kandai Waraiko Research Symposium

Osaka, Japan, December 3, 2007 (report from Till Weingaertner)

On December 3, 2006, Kansai University in Osaka (the host campus of the 2000 ISHS International Humor Conference) welcomed about 100 guests to the first Kandai Waraiko: A new research symposium which is planned to take place every year in the future. Sociology Professor Yoji "Gumon" Kimura initiated the Kandai Waraiko as part of his efforts to make his university into a leading site for humor research. The symposium promoted interdisciplinary research and offered researchers a chance to learn about and discuss the approaches of experts from different academic fields. Lectures were provided for the public and were meant to promote the general acceptance of the study and research of humor and laughter.

Teiichi Kawata (President of Kansai University) and Hiroshi Inoue (President of the Japan Society for Laughter and Humor Studies) welcomed visitors to the symposium, and lectures covered a range of approaches. Takashi Nozawa of Tsukuba University introduced his neuroscientific research, and Dr. H. Kimata reported about his experiences using laughter and humor in atopy-therapy. Professor Shinya Morishita of Kinjogakuin University gave a very lively speech about the sociological view of laughter and humor in European society and history. Lovers of Osaka-style comedy were happy to hear the lecture of Akira Fujita, who has been writing scripts for a number of famous comedians for many years. Comedy-fans became even happier when the famous comedian Yoshichi Shimada arrived and talked about his "Gabai Granny" books. These books are very popular in Japan and tell Shimada's memories about his grandmother who was able to live a life full of joy and laughter despite being poor. She incorporated humor into her philosophy of life.

After the lectures, the guests were invited to share a big laugh. Kansai University students performed a famous episode from Japanese mythology in which the sun goddess Amaterasu is called from a shelter by the big laughs of her fellow gods. The little play was arranged and directed by Professor Toshihiko Sekiya who is an expert of Kyogen, a comic version of the classical Noh theater.

After all, the Kandai Waraiko offered something new and interesting for everyone. The guests left with new ideas about laughter and humor, and maybe were even inspired for a happier way of living.

Humor in the News

Allen Klein to be inducted into the Hunter College Hall of Fame

We are happy to report that Allen Klein, ISHS member and President of The Association for Applied and Therapeutic Humor has been selected to the 2007 Hunter College Hall of Fame.

The Hall of Fame was created 35-years-ago to honor graduates for significant achievements in their field. Only a dozen from thousands of Hunter's past graduates are selected for this honor each year. Several past recipients have been Nobel Prize winners. So now there will be a "Jollytologist" among them.

The Hall of Fame induction ceremony will take place on April 27 in New York City with the official announcement at a luncheon at the Grand Hyatt Hotel on April 28.

Art Buchwald Remembered

Art Buchwald, who satirized the follies of the rich, the famous and the powerful for half a century as the most widely read newspaper humorist of his time, died January 17 in Washington. He was 81. Mr. Buchwald's syndicated column was a staple for a generation or more of newspaper readers, not least the politicians and government grandees he lampooned so regularly. His life was a rich tale of gumption, heartbreak and humor, with chapters in Paris, Washington, and points around the globe.

Once described as a "Will Rogers with chutzpah," Mr. Buchwald found enthusiastic readerships on both sides of the Atlantic. Early on, he became nearly everyone's favorite American in Paris for his satirical column in the European edition of *The New York Herald Tribune*. When he returned from overseas to write a new column, from Washington, he became even more popular. At its peak, it appeared in some 500 newspapers.

He delighted in stirring the pot—never maliciously, always vigorously. The world was mad (or at least a little nutty), he said, and all he was doing was recording it. He did it so well that he was awarded a Pulitzer Prize for commentary in 1982 (from the *New York Times*, January 19, 2007).

New Books on Humor

Wallace Chafe (2007). The Importance of Not Being Earnest: The Feeling Behind Laughter and Humor. Amsterdam: John Benjamins. 167 pages. € 99.00 / US\$ 59.00, ISBN: 978-9-02724-152-8.

The thesis of this book is that neither laughter nor humor can be understood apart from the feeling that underlies them. This feeling is a mental state in which people exclude some situation from their knowledge of how the world really is, thereby inhibiting seriousness where seriousness would be counterproductive. Laughter is viewed as an expression of this feeling, and humor as a set of devices designed to trigger it because it is so pleasant and distracting. Beginning with phonetic analyses of laughter, the book examines ways in which the feeling behind the laughter is elicited by both humorous and nonhumorous situations. It discusses properties of this feeling that justify its inclusion in the repertoire of human emotions. Against this background it illustrates the creation of humor in several folklore genres and across several cultures. Finally, it reconciles this understanding with various already familiar ways of explaining humor and laughter.

Jessica Milner Davis, Ed. (2006). Understanding Humor in Japan. Detroit: Wayne State University Press. 249 pages. US\$ 29.95, ISBN: 0-8143-3165-3.

A book presented in English with a collection of perspectives on the special rules and conventions of the use of humour and laughter in Japan. The book is fully-referenced with many Japanese-language examples and illustrations. Contributors include Goh Abe, Jessica Milner Davis, Hiroshi Inoue, Masashi Kobayashi, Heiyo Nagashima, Shokichi Oda, Kimie Oshima, Joel F. Stocker, Makiko Takekuro, Rokuo Tanaka, and Marguerite Wells.

Stephen E. Kercher (2006). Revel with a Cause: Liberal Satire in Postwar America. Chicago: University of Chicago Press. 572 pages. US\$ 35.00, ISBN: 978-0-226-43164-2.

Stephen Kercher here provides the first comprehensive look at the satiric humor that flourished in the United States during the 1950s and early 1960s. Focusing on an impressive range of comedy—not just standup comedians of the day but also satirical publications like *MAD* magazine, etc—Kercher reminds us that the postwar era saw varieties of comic expression that were more challenging and nonconformist than we commonly remember.

Allen Klein (2006). Three Jollytologist Books from Gramercy Press (US \$ 6.99 each): TeacherLaughs (ISBN: 0-51722-818-0), Parentlaughs (ISBN: 0-51722-817-3), & WorkLaughs (ISBN: 0-51722-819-7).

TeacherLaughs, ParentLaughs and *WorkLaughs* are filled with hilarious and witty anecdotes about teaching and learning, about the funny side of parenting, and making a living. Therapeutic humor expert "Mr. Jollytologist" Allen Klein has selected these quips, quotes, and anecdotes to keep teachers, students, parents and workers laughing even on the hardest days.

Sheri Klein (2007). Art and Laughter. London: I. B. Tauris. 168 pages. £14.99 / US\$ 24.50, ISBN: 978-1-85043-931-8.

This book investigates the surprisingly neglected role of humor in contemporary art. *Art and Laughter* looks back to comic masters, such as Hogarth and Daumier, and to Dada, Surrealism, and Pop Art, asking what makes us laugh and why. It explores the use of comedy in contemporary US and UK art from satire and irony to pun, parody, and bawdy humor.

Giselinde Kuipers (2006). Good Humor, Bad Taste. A Sociology of the Joke. Berlin: Mouton de Gruyter. 293 pages. € 98.00 / US\$132.30, ISBN: 978-3-11-018615-4.

This sociological study of the relationship between humor and social background explores the relationship between humor and gender, age, regional background, and especially, humor and social class in the Netherlands.

"Manzai" is a popular form of Japanese stand-up-comedy. This book offers a general introduction into the genre and its history. The focus is on the analysis of manzais by the contemporary comedians Yumeji Itoshi and Kimi Koishi. This analysis provides some insights into the comical routines of manzai, its humorous mechanisms and popular humor in Japan.
